Board Urges City to "Buy Quiet"

Re-printed below in its entirety is a resolution recently passed by the Jacksonville, Florida, Environmental Protection Board.

Resolution #81-1 Buy Quiet Program

WHEREAS, excessive noise is a nation ally recognized public health problem, and WHEREAS, noisy municipal equipment contributes significantly to City noise, and

WHEREAS, the Federal Environmental Protection Agency, in coordination with the National Institute of Governmental Purchasing, had initiated a "Buy Quiet" Program to foster municipal purchasing of-quieter equipment such as garbage trucks, air compressors, etc., and

WHEREAS, the Jacksonville Environmental Frotection Board firmly believes that c programs such as "Buy Quiet" are lor to governmental regulations, and WHEREAS, the City of Jacksonville purchases thousands of dollars of equipment which may be specified at reduced noise levels on a price competitive basis, and

NOW, THEREFORE, 8E IT RESOLVED that the Jacksonville Environmental Protection Board urgently requests that Mayor Godbold direct the Cantral Services Department (Purchasing Division), with the assistance of the Board and its staff, to join and involve itself in the "Buy Quiet" program. Further, the Board requests all independent agencies to do the same.

Following is the text of the Buy Quiet ordinance adopted by Atlanta's city council.

CLERK OF COUNCIL Atlanta, Georgia

SUBSTITUTE CRDINANCE January 19, 1981 BY FINANCE COMMITTEE

A SUBSTITUTE ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH A POLICY OF PROVIDING INCENTIVES FOR NOISE LEVEL LIMITATION AND REDUCTION IN ALL PURCHASES OF GOODS AND SERVICES BY THE CITY OF ATLANTA; TO PROVIDE THAT A VALUE SHALL BE ASSIGNED TO THE NOISE PRODUCED BY THE GOODS AND SERVICES OFFERED FOR PURCHASE SUCH THAT THE VALUE CREATES AN INCENTIVE TO PURCHASE THE QUIETER GOODS AND SERVICES; TO REPEAL CONFLICTING ORDINANCES; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

BE AND IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ATLANTA, GEORGIA, as follows:

Section 1. That it is the policy of the City to incorporate incentives for noise level limitation and noise level raduction in all purchases of goods and services. That the Mayor or his designee shall assign a value to the noise produced by the goods and services offered for purchase such that this value creates an incentive to purchase the quieter goods and services.

Section 2. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.
